Returning the "Survivor Tree" to the World Trade Center Site: A Sign of Resilience and Rebirth

In October 2001, a pear tree with lifeless limbs, snapped roots and blackened trunk was discovered and freed from the piles of smoldering rubble in the plaza of the World Trade Center.

The tree had been planted in the 1970s in the World Trade Center complex, near Church Street. The damaged tree measured eight-feet tall when it arrived in November 2001 at the Parks Department's Nursery. Its damaged limbs were pruned, leaving a blackened trunk with tiny roots to be planted. Year by year, with the tender care and attention, the tree has grown to greater and greater height, sprouting branches and bountiful leaves. Today, it is known as the "Survivor Tree."

After it had grown to a height of about 30 feet, the tree was returned to the World Trade Center site in December 2010. At the replanting ceremony 9/11 Memorial President Joe Daniels remarked, "This stalwart pear tree is a living symbol for everyone who survived the terrorist attacks and everyone around the world who has shown strength and resilience in the face of devastation."
